## Diaconal Association of the Church of England (DACE)

This year we held our annual training residential in the North of England at Wyredale Conference Centre. We looked at the document from the Norwegian Lutheran Church, **Diakonia in Action** and took from the paper, 3 themes to focus our own purpose and thinking;

Envisioning transformation, reconciliation and Empowerment,

Mission, and

Spirituality,

We also held our AGM, funds are diminishing and numbers of members (Full 40 associates 20) but the overall numbers of Deacons in the Church of England remain steady currently 125. DACE is the only organisation monitoring or supporting vocations and ministries. Pat Wright the Vice President has retired and is currently on an extended stay in S. Africa visting projects she enabled whilst in ministry there. New Vice Chair is Corrine Smith

DACE has continued to work on its web page and has regular enquiries about diaconate vocation. We are in Dialogue with the new central vocations team in London and have begun discussions with the other Anglican Deacon in the UK. There are no deacons in Ireland but the Archbishops of Scotland and Wales have identified representatives to begin the dialogue and Ann Wren will meet with these in the coming year.

We also continue our ecumenical dialogue when we meet at the DSC or MDO meetings.

## **Methodist Diaconal Order (MDO)**

The move from the Centre in Birmingham to offices in Methodist House in Central London is now complete. Convocation for MOD members was held in Swanick in May for 3 days with ecumenical representatives. The meeting was tempered by the fact the Warden was absent due to family illness and bereavement and has recently resigned having held the office for her two terms. Karen McBride is Acting Warden and has overseen the transition to London. A new Warden will be elected at this year's Convocation. Please keep the Order in your prayers at this time of change.

All new deacons have been placed and a full number were ordained at Conference in the summer. There were more potential places for deacons than people.

A huge piece of work on the theology of ministry is being done by the Faith and Order Committee. This group is considering all ministries and their nature, role and function and how ministries work together.
